SUBJECT: **Mandate Maintenance Report Four: December 2014 – February 2015**

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#### **PURPOSE**

This Deed of Mandate (DOM) Maintenance report is provided to the Office of Treaty Settlements (OTS) from the Tūhoronuku Independent Mandated Authority (Tūhoronuku IMA) as the group mandated by Ngāpuhi for negotiations with the Crown.

This report is also provided as a condition of the Crown's recognition of the DOM.

#### **Summary of achievement throughout the reporting period**

Since our last report, dated 9 November 2014, the Tūhoronuku IMA has:

- Prepared and presented evidence to the Waitangi Tribunal Urgent Hearing as an interested party to the Crown regarding the Crown's mandate process;
- Commenced interviewing candidates for negotiator positions;
- Submitted draft Terms of Negotiations to the Office of Treaty Settlements; and
- Completed drafting an Engagement Plan – to be finalised February 2015.

#### **ACTIVITY**

During the months of November and December the Urgent Hearings became our priority and has had a major impact on our timeframes and funding. Most of this work will be picked up on in January/February 2015.

#### **Updating Ngāpuhi**

The Tūhoronuku IMA remains committed to updating Ngāpuhi on a regular basis. On the 16<sup>th</sup> October 2014, the Tūhoronuku IMA updated our Ngāpuhi Kaumātua Kuia. Following this hui, and as per previous rounds of hui, Tūhoronuku will continue to host hui throughout New Zealand and Australia.

The Hui in the urban rohe have been completed. The Urgent Hearing had an impact on our ability to update Ngāpuhi in Te Whare Tapu o Ngāpuhi and Australia - these are scheduled to be completed by April 2015.

All Hui were advertised and generated an interest from those who wouldn't normally show an interest. While attendance at these hui has been low, it has allowed for a robust and focused korero.

During these rounds of Hui, the Tūhoronuku IMA the discussion on PSGE was introduced and people were encouraged to consider their aspirations for a Ngāpuhi Settlement. Representation, decision making and benefitting from a settlement were common themes that came through.

#### **Developing Hapū Profiles for Negotiations**

Focus continues to be engaging our mandated Hapū Kaikōrero within the five regions to commence developing their respective hapū profiles for negotiations purposes that will contribute to informing the scoping of a negotiations specific research programme.

Prior to the Urgency Hearings, Hapū Kaikōrero were provided with questionnaires to assist in the development of hapū profiles for negotiations purposes.

Preliminary research is to be undertaken to scope and assess research requirements for settlement negotiations with the Crown.

#### **Developing Hapū Redress**

A research scoping project has been developed to identify negotiation research requirement for Hapu historical and cultural redress options. The outcome of the scoping will form the basis upon which a full research and GIS mapping programme will be developed.

The scoping will assist with identifying research and mapping projects completed or commissioned for the purpose of the Waitangi Tribunal's Wai 1040 Te Paparahi o Te Raki Inquiry.

#### **Future Hapū Kaikōrero Elections Process**

As reported in November 2014, the door remains open for those Hapū who are yet to determine their representation. Our priority is increasing the number of hapū representation to ensure the best possible settlement for Ngāpuhi katoa. This has always been the position of Tūhoronuku.

The Tūhoronuku IMA will be guided by hapū on this matter and have commenced discussions with the Crown on streamlining this process.

### **Urgent Hearings**

The Waitangi Tribunal Urgent Hearing became a priority for the Tūhoronuku IMA.

As reported in November the level of expectation placed on the Tūhoronuku IMA and the impact on our ability to deliver due to funding restrictions made it difficult to meet these commitments.

A positive of these hearings was having the opportunity for Ngāpuhi to hear the true TIMA model for the first time.

### **Ngāpuhi Hui-a-Iwi**

At the invitation of Kingi Taurua, Tuhoronuku IMA agreed to attend a Hui-a-Iwi on the 20<sup>th</sup> December 2014, Te Tii Marae, Waitangi. The intent of our presentation to present a way forward for Ngāpuhi katoa not to traverse old ground, or revisit those matters that had come out during the Urgent Hearings (1-5 December 2014).

Between 150 – 200 people attended however Sonny Tau made a decision with other Tuhoronuku IMA members present that Tūhoronuku IMA withdraw from the hui as there was no control at the Taumata level. That people from outside of the Waitangi Marae Taumata were speaking over the top of the Taumata and that there was no control – the ability to provide a presentation free from distraction in such an atmosphere was very low. A full account is provided at appendix 3 of this report.

### **Appointment of Negotiators**

The Tūhoronuku IMA extended the announcement of Negotiators to the end of February. During this time an interview process has commenced and the Tūhoronuku IMA Board expect to be in a position to announce the successful candidates.

The Deed of Mandate makes provision for the appointment of at least three and no more than six negotiators.

### **Terms of Negotiations**

During the previous reporting period, draft Terms of Negotiations were submitted to the Office of Treaty Settlements for comment. At the recommendation of the Crown, Tuhoronuku IMA agreed to extend the signing of Terms of Negotiations from December 2014 to the end of February 2015.

As well as this, Tūhoronuku also developed a draft Engagement Plan (*Te Pae Herenga*). The draft will be finalised at the next Tuhoronuku IMA Board meeting in February. It has been submitted to the Crown for comment before being finalised and can be viewed on our website [www.tuhoronuku.com](http://www.tuhoronuku.com).

### **Funding Update**

The Project Team continues to work with Crown Forestry Rental Trust to develop applications for funding. The following summarises the status of funding applications and approvals:

- *Crown Forestry Rental Trust (CFRT) – TIMA Funding for Terms of Negotiation (TON)*

This Total funding of \$268,130 was approved, this includes specialist advice of \$23,630, with the balance for operational funding.

This contract has been varied to align with the Crowns Terms of Negotiations signing being extended to February 2015 and not December 2014.

- A research application for \$66,699 for research scoping for negotiations was approved in December. At the time of drafting this report, the contract for this funding was being finalised.
- An application \$4.7m to support Agreement in Principle will be submitted to the Crown Forestry Rental Trust for consideration at the February 2015 board meeting.

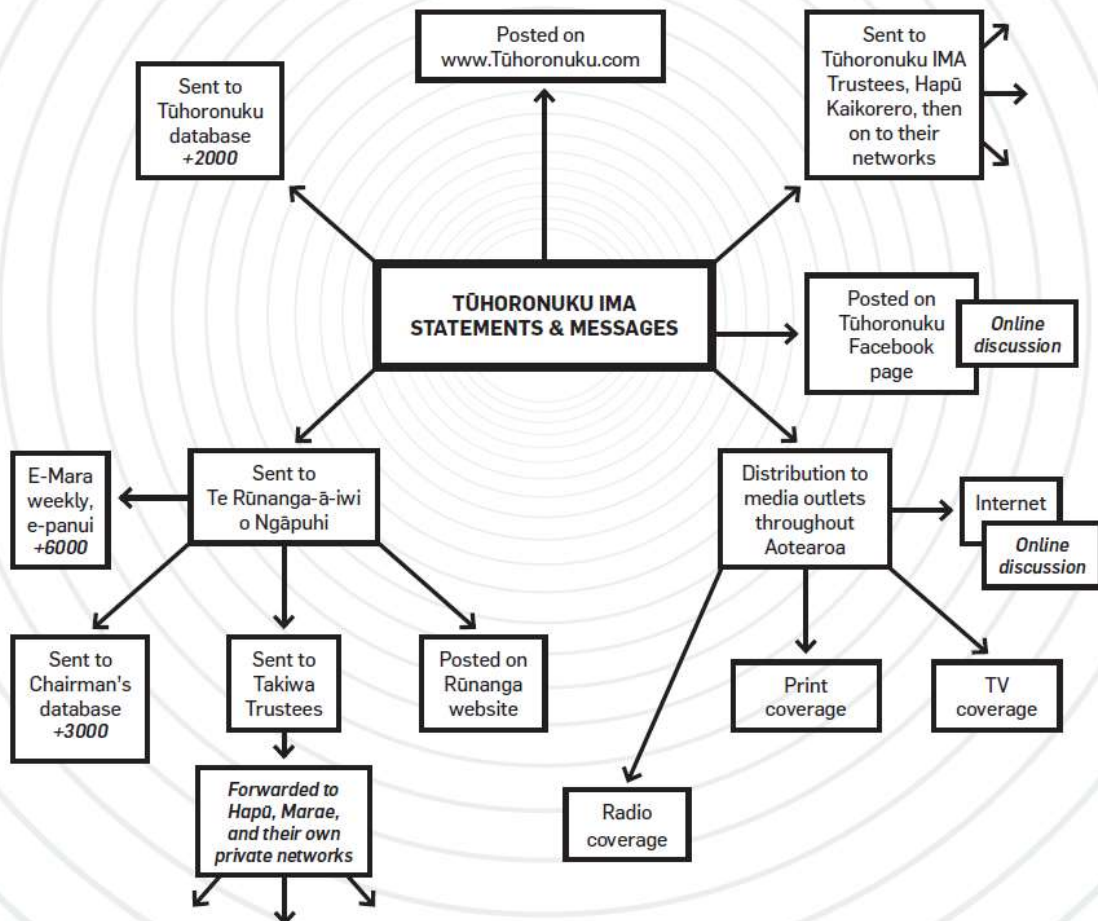

5. **5 x Media Statements** were written and distributed during the three month period, some of which have been picked up by Maori and mainstream media. All were posted on the Tuhoronuku and Te Runanga-a-iwi o Ngapuhi websites, Tuhoronuku Facebook page and Twitter. Also forwarded within Ngapuhi internet networks.
6. **Te Runanga-a-iwi o Ngapuhi media vehicles:** all Tuhoronuku IMA media statements have been distributed through Runanga media vehicles, and featured in the weekly E Mara e-panui with a **database of 6000**. Some media statements are also featured on the Runanga website, and distributed through the Chairman's database.
7. **Tuhoronuku Panui:** A Tuhoronuku IMA panui, giving an overview of the month's activity, is issued once a month to all stakeholder databases. The panui is also posted on the Tuhoronuku website and Facebook page.
8. **Radio, television and print coverage:** Significant coverage of the Ngapuhi settlement was given during the Waitangi Tribunal Hearing from 1-5 December, both by Maori and mainstream media. Many of these stories are on tuhoronuku.com and Tuhoronuku Facebook page.
9. **A freephone and email address** is published on tuhoronuku.com website to give assistance to those Ngapuhi wanting more information about the Ngapuhi settlement.

## Waitangi Tribunal hearing: an overwhelming call for one Ngāpuhi settlement

Last week's Waitangi Tribunal Urgent Hearing at Waitangi proved a defining moment in the historic Ngāpuhi settlement journey.

To our whānau who attended and to those who were not able to attend, but listened by radio, it was a week of understanding, connecting and testing of our Ngāpuhitanga.

Key reflections from the five day hearing:

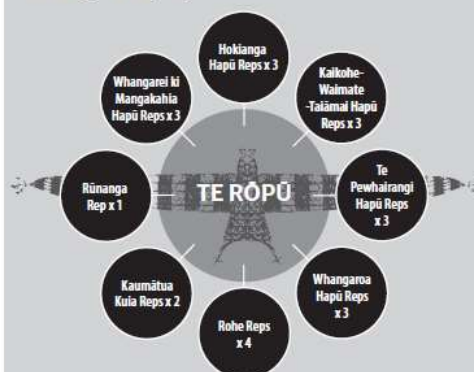
- Overwhelmingly, our people want a single settlement**  
 This came from Kaumātua Kuia, the representatives of Ngāpuhi hapū and urban regions on the Tūhoronuku IMA and from the hapū leaders opposing the Tūhoronuku model. Said Hone Harawira: "There should not be separate settlements. If our hapū are strong and connected, united... we'll be unstoppable."
- Hapū do not know enough about the Tūhoronuku IMA model**  
 Time and again people at the Tribunal hearing said they did not know about the amended Tūhoronuku model, which gives hapū 15 of the 22 representative positions – therefore a majority voice in decision making. Said Tūhoronuku IMA Chairman Sonny Tau: "Hapū need more information about what the Tūhoronuku model offers... we believe they will find this model can suit their needs."
- The Tūhoronuku door is always open...**  
 To Te Kotahitanga, Hokianga Collective and others questioning the Tūhoronuku IMA model, we say "Nau Mai, Haere Mai". Our door is always open for you to join us. Already, a number of hapū have requested hui, and on 20 December Ngāti Rāhiri and Ngāti Kawa will host a Ngāpuhi Hui Ā Iwi at Te Tii Waitangi Marae. The momentum is growing!
- This is a matter for Ngāpuhi, not the Waitangi Tribunal or Crown**  
 Perhaps the most memorable message from the hearing was by the Hon. Shane Jones, when he warned: "Rangatiratanga demands Ngāpuhi take responsibility for these issues themselves. Embroiling the Crown in an internal wrangle does not necessarily make them responsible, and recourse to the Tribunal is no substitute."

The whakapapa of the enduring Ngāpuhi settlement journey began in 2008. Since then, Tūhoronuku has consulted with Ngāpuhi, developed a representative model and:

- in 2011 was overwhelmingly granted a mandate from Ngāpuhi (76.4% of those who voted)
- in 2014 this mandate was recognised by the Crown
- put in place an entity legally separate from Te Rūnanga Ā Iwi O Ngāpuhi
- held elections for the new 22 member Tūhoronuku IMA board.

### The Tūhoronuku IMA structure

The number of representatives on the Tūhoronuku IMA has increased from 15 to 22, with hapū representatives forming the majority.

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**PURPOSE**

1. The purpose of this file note is to provide an account of the Ngāpuhi Hui-ā-Iwi called Ngāti Rāhiri and Ngāti Kawa, Te Tii Marae, Waitangi, 20 December 2014.

**BACKGROUND**

2. At the invitation of Kingi Taurua, TIMA attended to present on a way forward for Ngāpuhi katoa, post the Urgent Hearings we have just gone through. This meeting was suggested by Mr. Taurua immediately after the Urgent Hearing in Waitangi as a way forward for Ngāpuhi. TIMA agreed with Mr. Taurua as we saw a real chance of attracting more Hapū and individuals to TIMA. It was at those hearings that many Ngāpuhi had heard the true TIMA model for the first time
3. The intent of our presentation was not to traverse old ground, or those matters that had come out during the Urgent Hearings (1-5 December 2014).
4. The presentation comprised a short recap from 2009 - 2014, on the models first proposed to what TIMA have now and covering off on how TIMA see matters going forward. And, reminding all that the door is always open.
5. TIMA would also deal with the issue of Hapū withdrawing from the mandate. The key points to be made on the day:
  - Tūhoronuku is not interested in abandoning all the work that has been achieved thus far, just to go back and start again;
  - We are sick and tired of other people speaking for and on behalf of Tūhoronuku;
  - The members on the Tūhoronuku IMA who have been through a rigorous election process will not stand aside;
  - We are always open to suggestions on how this current model can be tweaked to better accommodate those who are not happy with its makeup;
  - We are always open to come and meet with Hapū, Whānau or groups to discuss and clarify the position of Tūhoronuku;
  - We want to settle as Ngāpuhi being a large natural grouping - *this is reinforced by everyone who spoke at the Urgent Hearings;*
  - *The door is never closed to anyone*
6. The attendance of TIMA was not to contend with anyone but to state the facts about our model and answer questions that required clarification.

7. Kingi Taurua was advised that the Tūhoronuku IMA were not seeking any resolutions on the day but would want Hapū and Whānau to take this information away and meet with their respective groupings.

8. Between 150 and 200 people were in attendance.
9. After the morning tea break the Hui reconvened in the Wharenuui and Tūhoronuku were invited to commence discussions.
10. Hirini Henare stood and asked that the TV1 camera crew in the Whare leave, he didn't want any discussions 'recorded and broad cast around the world and on face book'. He also advised the Hui that Ngāti Hine will not be going under any group. Ngāti Hine will have its own settlement.
11. The Taumata advised the Hui that it was okay for the TV1 crew to stay as many of our Ngāpuhi Nation were not at the Hui and needed to know what was going on.
12. The issue got contentious and the Hui became dysfunctional – people did not listen to the Taumata.
13. Sonny Tau made three attempts to commence discussions and was interrupted each time (regarding the TV1 camera crew). A decision was then made for the Tūhoronuku IMA to depart the Hui.
14. Sonny Tau asked Pita Tipene to call a Hui at Otiria Marae in the near future and invite the Tūhoronuku IMA to continue this kōrero.
15. It was noted that Pita Tipene agreed to call a Hui-ā-iwi in the near future and would invite all to attend. Sonny Tau then confirmed that the Tūhoronuku IMA would attend if the Taumata had control of the hui.
16. It must be stated here that the reason that Sonny Tau decided that the Tūhoronuku IMA withdraw from the hui was that there was no control at the Taumata level. That people from outside of the Waitangi Marae Taumata were speaking over the top of the Taumata and that there was no control.
17. Kingi Taurua tried to get some semblance of control but was shouted down and decided to leave the Wharenuui in the hands of those who were over ruling the Taumata.

18. It was at this point that Sonny Tau decided to vacate the Wharenui as any hope of having a presentation free from distraction in that atmosphere was hopelessly lost
19. Sonny then spoke with the Tūhoronuku IMA Board members who agreed that the Tūhoronuku IMA vacate the hui.
